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# Instructions

Choose one activity per week to practise your spellings and colour it in when complete.

<p><b><u>Fun and games</u></b>  Play charades or pictionary</p>	<p><b><u>Mnemonics</u></b>  Create mnemonics to learn harder words.  For example: <b>because</b>  big  elephants  can't  always  use  small  exits</p>
<p><b><u>Perfect Poems</u></b>  Turn your spelling words into a poem where each word is spelled out.  If you'd like to perform your song in school, ask your teacher.</p>	<p><b><u>Super Sentences</u></b>  Create sentences using your spelling words. Can you use a range of different punctuation marks?  ., ! ? " ' : ; ()</p>
<p><b><u>Games</u></b>  Play a spelling themed board game at home.  This could be Scrabble, Boggle or Bananagrams. Can you spell out your spelling words?  If you haven't got a spelling themed board game at home, make up your own spelling game.</p>	<p><b><u>Online games</u></b>  Use SpellingCity.com or <a href="https://spellingframe.co.uk/">https://spellingframe.co.uk/</a> and play a game.</p>
<p><b><u>Thesaurus</u></b>  Look up your words in a thesaurus. Write down 3 alternative words that mean the same thing.  If you don't have a thesaurus at home, let your teacher know or you could use an online thesaurus.</p>	<p><b><u>Quiz me</u></b>  Get someone to quiz you on your words so you can work out which spellings you need to spend time on. Make posters of those words and display them around your home.</p>
<p><b><u>Silly Syllables</u></b>  Break your words up in to syllables and write each syllable in a different colour.</p>	<p><b><u>You choose</u></b>  Pick your own task</p>
